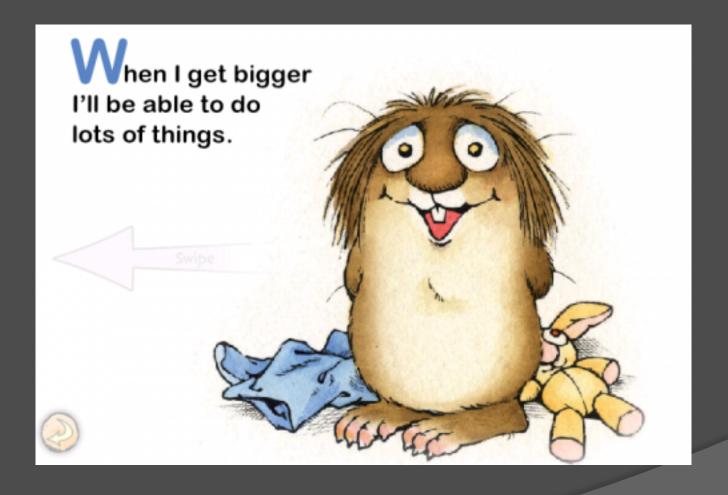


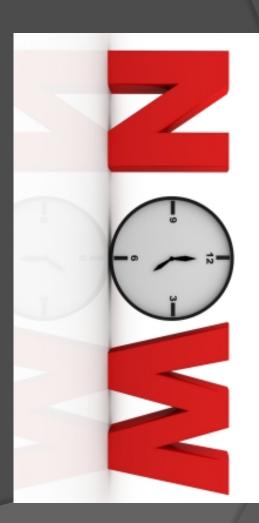
When to start?

NOW is a good time

- From very first stages
- Learning new piece
- Explain why things sound the way they do
- Guided choices
- Harmony and theory in spite of time conflict
- Harmonic progressions
- Musical exposure



Signs along the way



Everything you need is already there

Century: when was the piece written

Composer

Title and tempo marking

Meter

Listen to different pieces by the same composer to learn about their style Articulation

Dynamic markings

Meter changes

Musical terminology and expression (example: dolce)

Accents

Articulation

- Two-note slur = more-less
- Non-legato
- Legato as a physical and musical term
- Tenuto
- Staccato



Dynamics and more

- All the dynamics are played in context
- Cresc.=piano;Dim.=forte
- Sfz/Accent
- There are no two notes that sound the same
- Ritardando
- Rests



Beats



- 2/4 first beat is the strong beat
- 3/4 first beat is the strong beat
- 4/4 First and third beats are strong, however, first is stronger than third
- 6/8 divided into groups of two: 123-456 Strong beats are 1 and 4, however, first is stronger than 4
- 12/8 divided into groups of four: 123-456-789-10,11,12. Strong beats on 1,4,7, and 10. (first beat is the strongest)

Balance and Voicing

Shaping=grouping
Counter of the melody

High notes are important

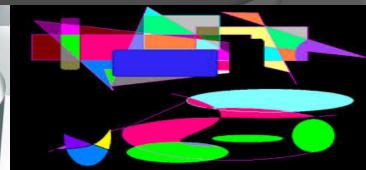
No accents after long or tied notes

The first note of the phrase is soft

Energy of the phrase moves towards the beat









Intonation= relationship between notes
Intervallic relationship
Harmony
Surprises and hidden gems

<u>REMEMBER:</u>

There is no dynamic control after the note is played – intonation is everything
